Where has the 2017-2018 program year gone? Like Carol Burnett says, "Seems like we just get started and before you know it, comes the time we have to say so long". Part of that song also said "I'm so glad we had this time together", which I am sure is what our seniors and students are feeling. Linking Generations is so privileged to offer Intergenerational Programs to our community. Over the past 14 years, we have seen so many wonderful connections and relationships develop between the generations that are years apart. Its especially rewarding when we witness students that connected years ago still continuing to visit their "linked" senior.

There continues to be such interest in Linking Generations that many more student and senior applications are continually received than volunteer positions. This program year we had 245 seniors and youth connecting each week or bi-weekly for visits – year after year we see an increase in both student and senior participation!

This past year, we partnered with Strathcona Museum to create a very special visit between our youth and our seniors. As both generations studied items used in the household or the on farms, discussions could be overheard from the seniors explaining to the students what each item would have been used for. We even had some seniors bring a unique heritage item to this visit, so as to share their own personal past and heritage with their 'linked' partner. A very special thank you to Strathcona Museum for allowing Linking Generations to use these precious heritage items.


2017-2018 Student and Senior Participation



The drama teachers and everyone in the play deserve to be mentioned. I personally look forward to next years invitation to attend the next performance. A few times this program year, the students treated us to an impromptu concert of one of the songs from the upcoming play. We all so enjoyed that. 
High School Student Volunteer

I have been with the linking generations program for 5 years now. Five years is just about a third of the time I've lived. Through this program, I can recognize now that five years is not that long of a time. Some seniors in this program are over 100 years old! Despite being in the program for a large portion of my life, I really only feel I've experienced a fraction of what any of these seniors could impart on me. I could spend every day just talking with any senior in the

room and I would never hear all of their stories. I also feel that I've gained a greater depth about how they live. Sometimes, when I'd be in class at school, I would find myself thinking "I can't wait until Thursday!" and just a couple weeks ago it struck me: Some of our seniors feel like this all week, every week. Once I realized this, I finally fully realized this program's impact on both us students and our seniors: for us, it has increased our compassion and has also given us a greater understanding of other ways of life. For the seniors, it has given



them someone they see often, someone they can talk to and share experiences with. I could never give enough thanks to this program for helping me develop these skills that I will have for the rest of my life, and I think I speak for the seniors when I say they'd thank you for giving them a friend.
